



### SHAMROCK FLOWER BLOCK









The block due for exchange in March is the Shamrock flower block. Use four of the same hue as the flower with white background corners. Or use four of the same print as the petals. These flowers with soft edges (no points) will look great in a final quilt. In addition to being here in the newsletter, the instructions and samples are posted on the Facebook site! Enjoy the experience. The winner of the blue and pink block of February was Karen Zappone. Let her know if you have one for her!

## SHAMROCK FLOWERS





Block:

**Ingredients**: All are 5-inch Charms (5in x 5in)

4 charms in the same color hue family — ANY hue family. Plaids and Stripes work!

2 charms in the WOW, or white family – with little to no other color on the fabric.

**Cut** the WOW s into half both directions creating four 2.5 inch squares:

Total Yield: 8 pieces at 2.5 inches square.


Draw a diagonal on the back of each of the WOW s.

### **Petal (or Leaf) Unit** – make four per block

Join one "WOW" corner to one Print corner by stitching ON the diagonal. {Option: create bonus triangles with a secondary stitch line at 0.5 inch towards the open corner. Trim off the excess fabric. (or make bonus HSTs.) Press back and under the print "hue" fabric. **Join** a second WOW fabric to a *neighboring* corner to create a petal block.

<u>Trim</u> the corner leaving a 0.25 seam allowance and <u>under the print</u> "hue" fabric...

**Repeat** for four (4) leaf or petal units.



**NOTE**: There will be no "points" on the leaves – these are flowers with rounded petals!

Layout the four petals with the 'points' facing outward in the block – see above placement. Join as per a 4patch.

Yield: One shamrock flower block measuring 9.5 inches.

A nice sized Project Linus quilt top can be made with 20 of these blocks. If sashing and stones are added only 12 would be required!

Make several entries as the blocks work up quickly and will look great in the final project.

Hi Everyone,

It was nice to see so many people brave the rainy weather and come to the February meeting. We didn't have as many UFO's as usual, but that just means better odds on winning for those who finished UFO's. Congratulations to the following quilters who finished UFO's: Linda, Stevie, Karen, Judy, Adele, Lois, Jo (who won homemade granola), Sally (who won granola too) and Despo (who won the \$20 Rosie's gift certificate). Great job everyone and all your names were added to the mega UFO drawing container for our June Mega UFO drawing.

Hopefully, you had a chance to organize some of your UFOs in January so you can get cracking on finishing those in 2024. If not, rainy days are perfect for getting things organized as many of our outdoor activities are put on hold. This week I am going to put future project kits together (fabric, pattern, backing, binding, etc.) into project bins or bags. The fabric isn't cut yet but at least everything is together. Have you ever come across fabric and wonder "Why did I buy that and what pattern was I going to use for it?". We think we will remember - Hah! Going forward, every time I buy fabric for a specific pattern, I'm going to put it into a project bag or bin with the pattern or at least a note that said what I'm planning to make. By the way I keep a shopping bag filled with plastic zippered covers that come with sheet sets, and comforters. These make great free project bags. Also, there are many YouTube videos on how to make project bags, some with clear plastic so you can see what's inside. You can also find zippered organizer bags at the discount store (like Marshalls, HomeGoods, etc.). People use them to organize items for their suitcases, but they make great project bags too. I am partial to the plastic bins from Artbin. They are semi-transparent and some of them have handles plus they stack nicely. JoAnn fabrics puts them on sale frequently or you can use one of your JoAnn coupons.



For all you long armers, a handy tip to keep on track with the longarming is to always load another quilt onto the longarm frame as soon as you finish one. This forces you to finish the loaded quilt if you suddenly have to quilt something else. Most of us won't want to unpin something already on the frame to put something else on the frame. For those of you who don't longarm, just try to have a top ready to quilt (with batting, backing, etc.) ready to start as soon as you finish quilting your current project. Of course, you can always send out your quilts to be quilted. I've heard lots of good things about Missouri Star's Quilting Service (includes batting and backing). For more info about Missouri Star ask Stevie Wheeler (the Opportunity of the Month Gal).

That's it for this month's tips. Have fun working on projects and be sure to get something finished for the March meeting.








# SIT AND SEW Every 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday



# TRAVEL TO HAMILTON FOR RETREAT OCTOBER 22-25, 2024

It is time to firm up your travel plans to travel to Hamilton for quilting fun with "Seaside Sewing with Friends Retreat" October 22-25, 2024. Registration for our "Sewing with Friends Retreat" opened in January 2024. Registration has been extended to May 2024 so there is still time to join your friends for a Hamilton adventure. After May the event will be opened to other interested quilters. We need 26 to keep the retreat just to our group. We currently have 14 registered and 6 more that have expressed interest. Information is now being shared with other guilds and quilting friends.

**Retreat Date**: October 22-25, 2024. October 22, 2024, is check in day with first meal in the evening with open sew after. Early arrival is available for Monday October 21, 2024, for an additional \$50.

**Retreat Fee**: \$450 which includes dorm -style sleeping accommodation (2-5 per room and shared bathroom), 8 meals, coffee station, a sewing room with individual tables, as well as irons and cutting stations.

**Sewing Machine**: Babylock sewing machines are available at no additional cost when arranged at the time of reservation. So, you only bring your personal sewing supplies.

**Early Check In**: Available on Monday for an additional \$50. If you don't know your travel plans at the time of registration so didn't choose early check-in let Jo know and she can contact our MSQ contact to add early registration to your account.

**Travel Arrangements**: Each participant is responsible for making their own travel arrangements. Flights from San Diego to Kansas City, Missouri our currently open on Southwest. Transportation arrangements from the airport to Hamilton can be arranged or rental car options.

**Accommodation**: Rooms in the retreat center sleep between 3-5. No bunk beds. Six dormitory style bathrooms are on the second floor. Two handicapped rooms are available on the lower level with reservations by special arrangement.

### **Brief Notes**

- Passwords must be secure. No short, easy to guess passwords. Mix caps, lowercase, numbers, symbols. Do not use for multiple accounts. Keep secret.
- Enable 2-factor/multifactor authentication
- Use password management software -Bitwarden , 1Password, Dashlane
- Norton 360, and iOS have built-in password management software
- Change Passwords regularly for high-risk accounts
- Beware of free Wi-Fi. It is very easy for hackers to spy on communications.
- Keep software up to date. Use antivirus software.
- Have one email for your primary email, and a second for everything else.
- Do not click on unexpected attachments.
- Unsubscribe from reputable sourced unwanted emails. Junk or spam, phishing,

report to email provider and the company that they faked.

- SMS messages are not secure. iOs are generally secure.
- Facebook Messenger is not secure unless you use "secret conversation", not commonly known.
- You can set up a Virtual Private Network, VPN, for better security by changing your router settings. You may need help to do this.
